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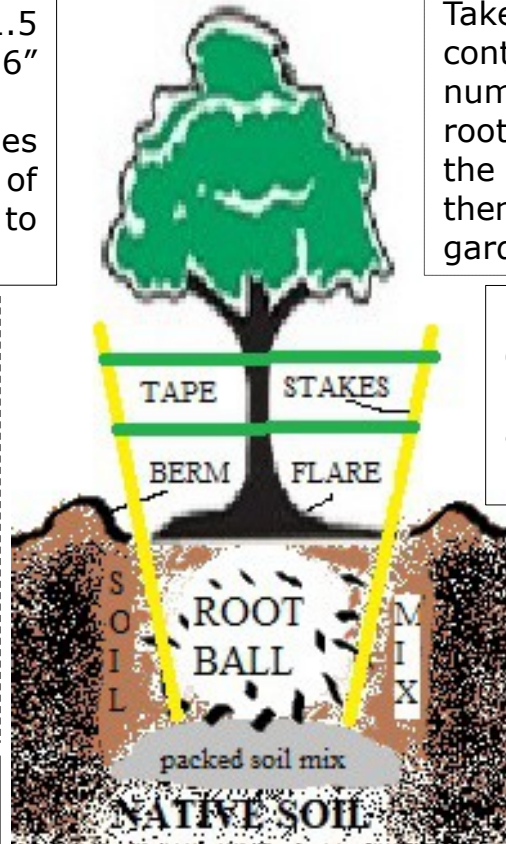

#1: Dig the hole 1.5 times the width & 3" - 6" deeper than the container size. Cut ridges on the sides & bottom of the hole with a shovel to avoid root binding.

#2: Prepare soil mix of equal parts native soil and mulch. Add GYPSUM and generous amount of soil mix at the bottom and pack in so once the plant is set in the hole the top of the rootball will be slightly higher than ground level.

#3: **DON'T** remove burlap or wire basket if included. Once stabilized in the hole, remove twine tying burlap and loosen it.



Take the plant out of the container. If you see numerous large circling roots on the outside of the root ball, loosen them using a claw-type garden tool.

Build a (berm) on the outside of the filled hole that is as wide as or wider than the plant.

For trees: stake with lodge poles. Carefully drive stakes through soil and mix, not the root ball. Tie tree to poles with stretch tape or wire. Protect the tree trunk with hose or poly tube if using wire.

Fill & pack in soil mix, careful not to damage rootball with excessive force.
